



ALMOST 2/3s OF OHIOANS LIVE IN LEGACY CITIES/METROS



- living in a legacy city or the metro area anchored by one
- living outside a legacy city or metro




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CENTRAL OHIO IS < 20% OF STATE'S POPULATION








MOST PLACES IN OHIO HAVE LOST POPULATION SINCE 2000

Population Change 2000-2020



- 81% (18 of 22) legacy cities lost pop
- 62% (10 of 16) metros lost pop
- 53% (47 of 88) counties lost pop


- Lightest Yellow=more than -20% loss in population
- Darkest Blue=more than 20% gain in population





HOUSEHOLD INCOME IN OHIO IS BELOW NATIONAL MEDIAN

Ohio Household Income v. Nation, 2010, 2015, 2020



Ohio's median household income is lower than the national average and has not kept pace with increases nationally.

WHAT OHIO LOOKS LIKE IF WE TAKE CENTRAL OHIO OUT OF THE MIX






OHIO, WITHOUT CENTRAL OHIO, LOST POPULATION FROM 2000 TO 2020

Entire state of Ohio


State of Ohio minus Columbus metro







OHIO IS AGING, EXCEPT FOR COLUMBUS CITY + METRO



The state as a whole and cities and metros outside Columbus experienced notable decreases in people under age 54.

But Columbus city and metro experienced increases in younger residents.

Light blue=Columbus Dark blue= Columbus metro

"NEW COLUMBUS" WOULD BE OHIO'S 6TH LARGEST CITY IN 2020

New Columbus Residents Alone from 2000-2020 Could Comprise Ohio's 6th Largest City



If the people who moved to the City of Columbus from 2000 to 2020 were their own municipality, they would populate the 6th largest city in the state in 2020






OHIO, WITHOUT CENTRAL OHIO, LOST A LOT OF WORKERS



From 2000 to 2020, Ohio's labor force decreased by 91,000 workers. If Columbus MSA is removed from the mix, Ohio lost 306,000 workers


Households in Ohio have been decreasing in size in last 2 decades.

- Columbus insulates the blow of shrinkage statewide
 - Ohio: 3.2% shrinkage
 - Ohio (without Central Ohio): 4.7% shrinkage





HOME VALUES IN COLUMBUS + ITS METRO WERE NOTABLY MORE THAN LEGACY CITIES + METROS IN 2020



- Columbus city values grew 3x as fast as legacy city values from 2000 to 2020
- Columbus metro values grew 1.6x faster than legacy city metros









TAKEAWAYS: OHIO IS A LEGACY STATE, LET'S WORK WITH THAT!

- Ohio is a legacy state with one very high growth region (e.g. central Ohio) and a moderate growth region (e.g. southwest Ohio)
- Policymakers at state and local level need to focus on policies that are "yes, and". We are not saying we should not support Central Ohio.
 - Let's continue utilizing policies and programs that have done well by Columbus. And,
 - Let's also start developing policies that are realistic about challenges and opportunities in Ohio's legacy communities.
- There are many many many reasons to invest in our legacy communities: least of which is that nearly 2/3s of the state's population lives in a legacy city or metro!





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
