

Mobile Workshop

For landlocked and built-out communities, infill redevelopment is often the viable only option. - Defense Supply Center Columbus (Drive-by)
 A 26-agency military installation on 530-acres; The City of Whitehall's primary employer (8,000+ employees)
- Wasserstrom Company Headquarters (Drive-by)
 World's leading restaurant supplier and distributor of food service supplies and equipment with 1,800+ employees;
 Headquarters (225 employees) moved to Whitehall in 2017
- Discover Financial Call Center (Drive-by)
 Under construction community-based call center (100,000 sq ft) with 300-500 jobs; Modeled after call center model adopted in Chatham neighborhood of southside Chicago
- Norton Crossing (Drive-by)

 Developed by Continental Realty on the site of the former Commons at Royal Landing (known widely as housing of last resort), Norton Crossing constituted a \$50 million investment into the Whitehall community. Opened in 2021, it represented the first new market rate housing brought to Whitehall since the 1970s.
- Priority Designs (Drive-by)
 World-class product research and design firm; Often described as the business catalyst behind Whitehall's recent redevelopment uptick
- Rockwell District
 50-acre infill redevelopment site adjacent to I-270. Master developer, T-Squared Developments, plans to bring

- Whitehall Community Park and YMCA (Drive-by)
 Adjacent to the planned Rockwell District, the newly renovated park is one of the largest urban nature parks (80-acres) within I-270
- Heartland Bank Headquarters (Drive-by)
 Heartland Bank recently announced plans to double their footprint in Whitehall; Original development agreement supports bond for adjacent park improvements
- The Enclave on Main (Drive-by)

 Developed by Woda Cooper Companies, the former brick yard will soon host 102-units of LIHTC supported workforce housing; Anticipated certified LEED building
- Wirthman Yard (Drive-by)
 Proposed by LDG Development (Louisville, KY), the former automotive salvage yard recently received City of Whitehall approvals and a CRA agreement for a 316-unit workforce housing complex. Site is under a VAP, with redevelopment and environmental clean-up supported by a \$5.05 million Ohio Department of Development Brownfield Remediation Grant

Yaromir Steiner formed Steiner + Associates in 1993 with a vision of creating welcoming, sustainable, pedestrian-friendly, Town Center destinations—environments for people to not only shop, but also to live, work and play. Over the past 24 years, the company has turned that vision into reality by developing more than 7.4 million square feet of mixed-use space including retail, restaurant, residential, entertainment, hospitality and office uses. Mr. Steiner oversees all operations, development, leasing, and management efforts for the Steiner + Associates and its portfolio.

He travels extensively to meet with community leaders and tenant partners and maintains a "hands-on" approach to development and property management.

He is frequently invited to address community, civic and professional organizations in the U.S. and abroad to share his unique insights and perspectives into the retail real estate development world. Mr. Steiner has held a variety of positions in civic and professional organizations. He served as a past board member of the Richard M. Ross Hospital, a past Trustee of the International Council of Shopping Centers, a past Director of the International Council of Shopping Centers Foundation, and a past Board of Trustee member of the New Albany Community Foundation, the Arthur G. James Cancer Hospital, and Richard J. Solove Research Institute Foundation.

He has also served as President of the French American Chamber of Commerce in Houston, President of the Coconut Grove Chamber of Commerce, Director of Greater Miami Convention and Visitors Bureau, and is a past President of the Simon Kenton Boy Scout Council of Central Ohio.

Sheryl SculleyAuthor of *Greedy Bastards*

When Sheryl Sculley was recruited to serve as San Antonio's city manager in 2005, the organization she inherited was a disorganized mess. City infrastructure was crumbling, strong financial policies and systems were non-existent, many executive positions were vacant, public satisfaction was low, ethical standards were weak and public safety union salaries and benefits were outpacing revenues, crowding out other essential city services.

Simply put, San Antonio was on the verge of collapse. Her book, *Greedy Bastards*, tells the story of Sheryl and her new team's uphill battle to turn around San Antonio city government. She will take you behind closed doors to share the hard changes she made and the strategies she used to create mutually beneficial solutions to the city's biggest problems. Many of the issues Sheryl found in San Antonio are present in cities across the US. Her story provides a guidebook for any city official tasked with turning around an underperforming organization.

Sheryl Sculley is known as a change agent with 45 years of experience in city management. She served as city manager of San Antonio, Texas (2005-2019), where she was the chief executive officer of the municipal corporation of 13,000 employees, an annual operating and capital budget of \$2.8 billion, and a city population of 1.5 million residents.

Sculley brought a completely new level of fiscal management to San Antonio and launched ambitious capital infrastructure campaigns using the City's newly earned Triple A credit rating to borrow at favorable interest rates to invest more than \$3 billion in a city long accustomed to underinvestment.

One of Sculley's greatest achievements is her leadership development and succession planning. All six of the deputy and assistant city managers that she promoted and hired were recognized as credible candidates to become San Antonio's next city manager. Deputy city manager Erik Walsh succeeded Sculley, while deputy Peter Zanoni was hired as city manager in Corpus Christi, joining T.C Broadnax, an earlier hire of Sculley's, who went to become city manager of Tacoma, WA and now Dallas, and Penny Postoak Ferguson, another earlier hire, who was appointed County Manager of Johnson County, Kansas.

Sculley is married and has two adult children. She is a Life Member of ICMA and a fellow in the National Academy of Public Administration. She is also an adjunct professor at the LBJ School of Public Affairs at the University of Texas in Austin.
